Kerry Noon at Sleepy Creek Tree Farm & Bed & Breakfast, right on Sleepy Creek at Shades Lane, will demonstrate the special characteristics of different evergreen trees and what to look for in selecting a tree for your home. She will also have holiday wreaths and trees for sale then.

The Sleepy Creek Watershed Association is an organization of citizens working to protect and preserve Sleepy Creek and to educate the community on the value of this precious natural resource in Berkeley Springs, WV.

To reach the farm, go east on Rt. 9 about 9/10 mile, then turn right onto New Hope Road. Go 4/10 of a mile. At the point where New Hope bears sharply to the left, go 3 miles, then turn right onto Mountain Run Road. Cross over Sleepy Creek Bridge, go ½ mile, look on left and see Christmas tree field. Go straight onto Shades Lane, a gravel road, about 50 feet and turn left. There is a dead end sign directly across from the driveway. Pull down the road and park.

Protect Sleepy Creek: Don't Mow!

Muddy water means erosion upstream. The best way to prevent erosion is to maintain a riverside buffer of trees, shrubs and other vegetation that create a ground mat of plant roots to help hold down the soil and prevent it from eroding away.

The plants also help filter, trap and break down pesticides, fertilizers and other pollutants before they run off the land and enter the river. A canopy of trees provides shade and shelter for fish and other aquatic creatures.

If you own property on Sleepy Creek, don't mow down to the edge of the creek. Conservation experts suggest a buffer zone of at least 100 feet along waterways.

Erosion of soil along the edge of waterways and into the water can smother spawning beds of fish, kill aquatic insects and ruin good water quality.

Clearing a vista to the river, "getting rid of unsightly tangles" and "clearing away the underbrush" removes the very things that stabilize the banks and keep the water clean and healthy.
