Protecting Your Groundwater

The next general membership meeting will be May 15 at 7 p.m. at Coolfont Resort. Guest speaker Rick Shaver will discuss "Protecting Your Groundwater."

Rick is a geologist with the WV Dept. of Environmental Protection's Division of Water Resources. His background is in groundwater contamination cleanup, supply and protection.

Also on the agenda will be an update on the April and May cleanups and SCWA's bylaws, incorporation, and nonprofit status.

The meeting will be in the Lake Terrace Room at Coolfont's Treetop House. Enter the building, walk towards the restaurant, turn left down the stairs, turn right at the bottom, and it's the second door on the right.

Stream Monitoring Workshop Sat., May 17—Part 2

Join us in this hands on, in the stream actual monitoring session. Bring tough rubber gloves and rubber boots so you can get in the water, rub the rocks and see what critters are living in this section of Sleepy Creek.

Date: Saturday, May 17

Time: 10 a.m.

Place: The Gatehouse at Sleepy Creek, 1506 Harmison Lane.

The workshop is sponsored by SCWA and led by certified instructor Sherre Evasic, president of the Blue Heron Environmental Network, Inc. of Hedgesville.

In part 1 of the workshop, held March 22, we learned that the water quality of a creek or river can be assessed by the amount and type of the aquatic bugs living in it. Volunteer stream monitors use a Stream Quality Survey form to record stream conditions, land uses and insect diversity. They catch aquatic bugs in nets. Then, by identifying and counting the different types of bugs caught, the stream's health can be determined.

The survey form is sent to the state and becomes part of the state-wide database that records the water quality of the state's streams. A copy of the form is also sent back to the volunteers who can track water quality trends for their local stream.

West Virginia depends on volunteer monitors to help protect the state's 9,300 rivers and streams.

New Website for Mid-Atlantic River Conditions

The National Weather Service Middle Atlantic Forecast Center has launched a new service on their website to help keep people informed about flood probabilities and river conditions in the region. The website is:

This "Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Services" website combines existing condition and forecast information for sites along the rivers of the middle Atlantic region, which includes the entire Potomac basin. The information will prove useful to a wide range of river users, as well as those who live in zones prone to floods.

The site was launched February 19 and is still in a "shakedown" mode as designers refine it, so limited information may be available for some collection points.

What's TMDL?

TMDL is term often thrown around at stream monitoring workshops. It stands for Total Maximum Daily Load. Streams can handle only so many pollutants and remain healthy enough to fish and swim in them. Once the pollutants add up from all sources and a stream becomes unhealthy, it has to go through the TMDL process to be cleaned up. Pollutants add up. Your watershed starts at your door!
